Course: CIS290 – Object-Oriented Programming

Credit Hours: 4 quarter hours

Method of Delivery: Classroom M 6:00 – 9:30 pm

Course Description: Students will expand their knowledge of object-oriented programming techniques. Topics will include class methods and reusing classes, function templates and class templates, and stream input and output. An introduction to Microsoft Foundation Classes is also included in this course.

Prerequisite: CIS113 – Introduction to Programming.

Textbook: An Introduction to Object-Oriented Programming with Java, 5th *Edition*, 2010, McGraw Hill. Author: C Thomas Wu. ISBN-13: 9-780-073-52330-9.

Materials needed for this course: Textbook plus the free hardware and software in Midstate’s labs.

Learning Objectives: Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1) Create object-oriented programs in Java, C++, or C#
- 2) Use encapsulation to properly hide data and achieve cohesion
- 3) Utilize polymorphism to elegantly handle different types of functional inputs
- 4) Utilize inheritance to leverage the attributes and methods of existing classes
- 5) Describe and utilize other object-oriented concepts such as abstraction, collaborations, interfaces, and coupling

Policies and procedures:

1. Classroom activities are reinforced with homework and tests for learning efficiency. Students should expect a quiz, a test or a homework assignment on every chapter.
2. Homework assignments will be given to apply the concepts learned from lectures and textbook. Quizzes and exams will be given to assess student comprehension of the material.
3. In order to keep up with the class material, all class activities have to be completed in indicated times. Homework assignments, in particular, are due at the beginning of the class period; otherwise, they will be considered late. Late homework get 10% penalty per class period.
4. All homework is to be labeled with your name, date, and topic.

Class attendance:

Regular class attendance is highly expected. No more than 15% absence will be tolerated. It is the student's responsibility to notify the instructor ahead of time when a class will be missed. If you know of a time conflict to occur, turn in your homework early. If the instructor receives no call or email half an hour before the missed class period, the student would be considered absent and no makeup would be allowed for that day. Makeup exams will only be given in case of extreme, fully-reasonable situations. No makeup work is accepted during the final week of the term.
