COURSE: RR390 Multi-voice Speaker Designation for Judicial Reporting

METHOD OF DELIVERY: eLearning

CREDIT HOURS: 4 quarter credit hours

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

RR390 Multi-Voice Speaker Designation for Judicial Reporting - 4 Hrs.

The student will write multi-voice material of various types utilizing realtime principles specific to judicial reporting at appropriate variable speeds. This course emphasizes elements and uses of multi-voice speaker designations in regard to the judicial reporting industry and environments including freelance and official settings. Realtime accuracy will be charted and analyzed for improvement. Portions of realtime writing will be graded with a goal Total Error Rate (TER) of 95 percent or higher.

TOPICS

Executing speaker identification in multi-voice material in both freelance and official settings, formats for setting up examinations and witnesses, software instruction in creating dictionary entries and using features to assist in speaker identification, inserting parentheticals, punctuation of multi-voice material and parentheticals, realtime analysis and accuracy.

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LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

1. prepare for and write three- and four-voice multi-voice material of various types, including medical testimony, utilizing realtime principles specific to judicial reporting at appropriate variable speeds.
2. categorize and consolidate appropriate elements and uses of multi-voice speaker designations in various judicial reporting environments including freelance and official settings.
3. create appropriate EZ Speakers identifications and J-Defines (job dictionary definitions) in Case CATalyst.
4. manage and punctuate speaker interruptions and objections.
5. demonstrate multi-voice speaker designation skill.
6. develop and improve multi-voice realtime skill with a goal Total Error Rate of 95%.
7. analyze and chart multi-voice realtime accuracy for improvement.

- Realtime writing skills are assessed through capture of a first-pass realtime translation.
- Realtime knowledge is demonstrated through the realtime self-assessment form.

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TEACHER'S GRADING SCALE

Final Grade Computation: Final grade shall be computed by using the following percentages and grading scale:

- 50% Multi-voice Writing Assignments

Weekly Grade Computation:

10% Case CATalyst Skill Practice

Assignments are graded on completeness and accuracy. Late assignments are marked down one letter grade if submitted within 6 days of the due date. Assignments submitted after that period receive an F.

50% Multi-voice Writing Assignments

A minimum 50 pages of writing from the assigned take is required each week, and the take must be repeated at least 3 times. Take 3 is to be edited to 100%.

20% Multi-voice Writing Evaluation

This evaluation is done through Moodlerooms as a quiz. The first-pass translation is captured, then the student edits the Case CATalyst file and uploads the edited file for evaluation. A grading rubric will be provided for each evaluation.

10% Realtime Writing Evaluation

This evaluation is done in two parts: 1, capture of first-pass translation of an excerpt from audio that has been practiced all week, and 2, submission of a self-assessment on the accuracy of the translation. The self-assessment is reviewed for this part of the grade.
